
Patient Safety

Making health care safer



1 in 10 hospitalized patients experience harm, with at least 50% preventability.







- Improved patient safety
- Reduced risks and harm
- Better health outcomes
 - Enhanced patient experience
 - Lower costs

Burden of Medication Safety


- Medication safety is a worldwide issue; ADR, unsafe medication practices, medication errors - leading cause of injury in LMIC/HIC
- >50% of all medicines over the world are prescribed, dispensed or sold inappropriately
- Globally, the cost associated with medication errors has been estimated as \$42 billion annually



Goal: Reduce the level of severe avoidable harm related to medica by 50% over 5 years, globally.

Focus

- -Patients and public
- -Health care professionals
- -Medicines as products
- -Systems and practices
- Action areas
 - -High-risk medications/situatic
 - -Polypharmacy
 - -Transitions of care
- Monitoring and evaluation





- Over the next 5 years:
 - Contribute to the planning and implementation of the Challenge
 - Lead and coordinate Canada's contribution to the Challenge
- CPSI has contributed and advised at expert consultations related to the Challenge
- Currently:
 - Aligning our ongoing medication safety initiatives and priorities to the themes and action areas of the Challenge
 - Partnering with stakeholders, organizations and patient groups in Canada to develop an implementation plan to execute strategies, initiatives and tactics



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Patient safety incidents = 3rd leading cause of death Harm: every 1 minute and 18 seconds Death: every 13 minutes and 14 seconds

There are 4 categories of harmful events — 2014–2015 breakdown.

settings, patient safety incidents will cost the health care system




